## **Imbali 2023 in pictures**

2023 has been a year of forging new partnerships and strengthening existing ones. In early January Imbali began selecting participants for the 6-month Constitution Hill Museum Merchandise Product Development Programme (MMPD), a programme that was delivered in collaboration with Art Aid and Con Hill. This initiative connected Imbali with talented crafters, the Ditsong Museums, the Con Hill team, and expanded our network to include a range of new craft buyers. The programme culminated in July with a crafts product showcase at the Women's Jail at Con Hill where crafters exhibited their new products and received orders.

The group quickly evolved into a cohesive unit, and 14 students are advancing to the 2nd year. In the pages that follow, you can see some of the work that these talented individuals have made over the course of the year. Additionally, we have 4 graduates of the 3 year programme - this was the 'covid group' who started in 2021.

In April, Portia and Justine went to Denmark for their much -anticipated weaving residency. The 2 weeks they spent there were filled with exciting workshops, a visit to a crafts school and many wonderful meetings with weavers, all masters of their craft. Both Portia and Justine learnt many new skills including photo transfer, random weave, frame basket and binding basket to mention a few. They returned to Imbali in May refreshed, rested and very inspired! The relationships forged and connections made will be long lasting.

Then in October Danish weavers Ane Lyngsgaard and Eva Seidenfaden came to work with Imbali for 3 weeks. The first week was spent at Leshiba wilderness on the creative skills exchange between Imbali graduates and Limpopo crafters. This was a wonderfully enriching programme for all involved and will hopefully be the start of a new partnership between Imbali and Leshiba Wilderness and the craft artists of Limpopo.

The final two weeks of Ane and Eva's visit were spent at Imbali teaching Burkina weave and various binding techniques. Students learnt so much and will be continuing with these skills into next year.

Then we had a surprise visit from Estifanos Menchegirot, fashion designer extraordinaire from Addid Abbiba, Ethiopia. He taught pattern making and with these skills students have all created their own outfits which they will present in a fashion show at the year-end exhibition and graduation .

Despite the ongoing challenges of running an NGO in a difficult economic environment, we have continued in 2023 to celebrate numerous successes. Imbali remains an organization of integrity, maintaining high standards of training and professionalism. Supported by a dedicated core team of staff, wonderful students and an extensive network of skilled specialists, and efficient systems, Imbali provides students, customers, and partners with quality training, materials, expertise, and products. 
